	During this session, panellists are invited to discuss the major challenges to responsible business conduct in global supply chains of textiles and garments and to present initiatives that are effective in tackling those challenges.

	This session will focus on the role of the government in protecting workers' rights through strengthened labour inspectorates, effective national tripartite bodies and the OECD National Contact Points.

09:00 - 10:00	Due diligence in the textile and garment sector
	This session is divided into sub-sessions regarding management systems and policies, risk assessments and social compliance schemes. In each session, case studies are provided on how due diligence is applied in the supply chains of the textile and garment sector. Presentations will focus on the systems put in place and challenges and opportunities related to these systems.
:	A) Creating management systems and adopting policies
	Topics for this session include adopting a policy on responsible textile and garment supply chains, strengthening company management systems (e.g. building internal due diligence capacity, communicating with suppliers on due diligence, tracking and database systems for suppliers and other information on supply chains) and putting in place effective whistle-blowing or grievance mechanisms.

10.00 - 11:15	B) Risk assessments and management
	Topics for this session include undertaking risk assessments, including how to identify risks (e.g. designing red flags or other indicators of risk, the standards used and challenges encountered), designing and implementing appropriate risk management and response systems, and cooperating with industry peers, workers or other stakeholders to identify and manage risk. This session will also reflect on approaches to third party assurance or audits of due diligence practices, and the relationship between due diligence and emerging models for social dialogue and risk management.

	Guidelines for Multinational Enterprises and the ILO Declaration on Multinational Enterprises and Social Policy, this session will discuss the challenges and opportunities in their implementation, including in the context of due diligence requirements.
